

- 9. Demo: Making Money from Woodworking. Glen Friesen introduced panel: Jaime Russell (Sp??), Willie Bartch, Kevin Bream, Dave Dumphy, Kim Henry. Glen asked questions about: how they marketed their products (some online, social media, word of mouth, through craft and trade shows, and through galleries); how much time they spent woodworking (a few hours a week to full+time); insurance issues (if working at home, over a certain amount earned annually it becomes a business and must be insured as such; best options for making a living at woodworking (construction industry most reliable, lots of competition from online sellers now); advice for newbies (get a mentor, working for others is good experience—and secure—but being on your own is more fun, make things for yourself and do it to the best of your ability, make sure the finish is good, project professionalism, don't make too much of one thing for craft shows, be realistic about the finances); business vs craft (being a good salesperson is key, get an accountant and stay on top of the finances, know what expectations are at different venues, be a people-person with customers; pricing (have a template to plug in materials, labour, overhead, one-of-akind custom takes much longer than multiples, compare to similar items on Etsy/Amazon, pre-sell).

Trent Watts:

Trent showed us a bike box. It clips onto his bicycle quickly and provides a nice place to haul goods. The top is removable to allow larger payloads. It is made of baltic birch plywood, the corners are mitered and then splined with walnut. It is finished with wipe-on poly.



Mel Genge:

Mel showed us two projects, the first was a set of french rolling pins made of walnut and finished with butcher block oil.



The second project was a set of salt and pepper mills in walnut and beech and finished with Watco Oil. This set is a wedding gift.



Jamie Russell:


Jamie showed us a "Kinda Kudu" This is a table made of Manitoba maple, green ash and black cherry with a glass top. The



animal skull made from а green ash crotch so that the top of the head has no end grain. It is machine and hand carved with some turning for the legs. It is finished with General Finish Armor Seal.

Kevin Brehon:

Kevin brought us flowers. He made these of basswood in kumiko style. The petals were kerf bent to shape, he has dyed the petals with Kool-Aid.



Kevin also showed us a hexagonal kumiko trinket box, It is made of bird's eye maple basswood, spruce and fabric. It is finished with shellac and wax.



The Saskatchewan Woodworker Mark Noete:

Mark showed us a box with stand made of a box elder burl and ash. The box sits on a three legged stand that was turned and

then carved to produce the legs, The box has a finial stopper.

The finial and stand are stained with dark walnut stain. It is finished with shellac and



Don Rogers:

Don showed us a folding table. It was built from a plan but modified with a live edge top. It features dowelled joints. It is made of cherry wood harvested locally. It is finished with matte varathane. This piece was in the virtual wood show.

The Saskatchewan Woodworker SHAVINGS

Well, it is the end of the Guild season. I have to admit that it will be good not to have to write a column for the next couple of months. I have been contributing to the newsletter for the last 22 years or so. Going through my computer, it looks like I started writing my Shavings column in 2003. Since then, I have written ten columns a year all this time. For the most part, I have enjoyed doing this.

I wrote columns when I was in the hospital, when I was hurt and way too busy. I got used to working with deadlines and trying to figure out what the next article would be about. Twenty years of deadlines and thinking up article ideas has prepared me well for my venture into YouTube. Creating videos for YouTube is just like writing this column except it is on steroids. On YouTube I need to plan, shoot, edit and upload two videos every week and I have done this for the last 14 months.



(In the earlier years of this column, I bought and wrote about cheap tools. I hoped that they were good enough for my students to get started in woodworking. I have three if these routers now.)

The learning curve is steep, but certainly doable with an average amount of computer knowledge. I dedicate about three days each week to the production of these videos. So, it is a significant time investment. Add this to two days of teaching, which with preparation is

actually three, which leaves one day for projects. Time gets tight and at times, I feel that burnout is just around the corner, just like teaching.

Right now, all this effort is done for free. My channel is not successful enough to be monetized. In other words, for the 145 videos that I have uploaded as of today, I have not been paid anything to do all this work. If you have visions of becoming rich by posting videos on YouTube, think again. It is a tough way to generate extra income.

There can also be a sizeable investment to shoot these videos as well. I decided not to purchase equipment until the channel started to

make some money. To keep expenses down, I shoot video with my iPhone 13 and edit my videos with free software like Clipchamp which came installed on my computer. The only purchases to date have been two hand-held phone holders and a Princess Auto surplus tripod.

Another expense that I will start incurring this year is a limited number of promotional items. My channel's name, RLDR Custom Creations, is somewhat difficult to remember when I am talking to potential subscribers. So, I had some business cards made to hand out. Now, the only problem is that I have to remember to carry them.



(I am working on a simplified version of my logo that will go on the T-shirts. This is a work in progress design.)

I am also in the process of designing a simplified logo and screen printing some T-shirts and my shop smocks. I am going to do this largely to replace my aging fleet of T-shirts which are mostly Matisho Memorial shirts and assorted motorcycle shirts purchased many years ago. It is time to upgrade the fleet with my own channel apparel. If someone wants one, I would order them when I place my order. This way, I can give the merchandizing a try by simply purchasing shirts that I wear and extras for those who preorder. Just an idea.

Well, at the beginning of May, I hit the 500subscriber mark. This is not a milestone as far as YouTube is concerned, but it was to me. As far as subscriber numbers go, it took me 17 months to get to half of the 1000 subscribers that I need to monetize. The other catch when it comes to monetization is that you need 4000 watch hours in a year. This is also difficult for a small channel. But I will just keep working and see what happens. I am getting paid exactly the same as when I write my "Shavings" column for the Guild and I have persisted for 20 years. I will hopefully make it by then.


